You may think that the seatback displays in airplanes are custom made just for aircraft. That's apparently not the case though. According to statements from United Airlines, they are using off the shelf electronics for video displays. And those displays come with built in cameras and presumably microphones too. According to the airline, they are not being used but could eventually allow passengers to make video calls.

Why anyone would want to place a video call from an airliner is beyond me. And it doesn't require a tremendous amount of imagination to know what it would be like sitting next to a passenger making such a call. Can you imagine? There you are, trying to take a nap while the guy next to you proceeds to yell into the seatback in front of him. Oh joy! Sounds like an awful idea that only an airline could come up with.
